
## The Andaman Study Tour: March '2023 - Group 1


Next stop: Veer Savarkar International Airport, Port Blair

March 14, Day 2: Morning begins at 8 am with Bird watching activity near ANET. Students try and spot some unique species indigenous to the region. The rich avi-faunal diversity has always attracted ornithologists and bird watchers to these islands. Some endemic species include: Nicobar pigeon ,Green Imperial Pigeon, Nicobar Parakeet, Crested serpent eagle, White-bellied sea eagle, Edible-nest swiftlet, Emerald dove etc.

Off to see the betelnut, coconut and spices plantations. Expertise being shared and explained by Dinaz Maam.




Next stop to the Ross islands, named after marine surveyor, Daniel Ross. In December 2018, it was renamed as Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose Island. The historic ruins are a tourist attraction and that was seen in the light and sound show briefing about its colonial history.

Day 3, 15<sup>th</sup> March: Started with the much-awaited scuba diving with one batch and the inter tidal walk for the other. Unique and unforgettable experience of walking on the beach during low tide and getting a close-up view of the marine life in the tidal pools. Students were able to observe the aquatic biodiversity, learn about the local ecology and the importance of conserving the marine environment. The Andaman and Nicobar Islands are home to a wide variety of marine life including colourful fish, corals, crabs, starfish and sea urchins.



A visit to Port Blair is incomplete without a trip to Port Blair's most popular and yet most serene tourist destination - Munda Pahar. The trek trail courses through thick vegetation, beaches and some parts of the Chidiya Tapu Biological Park laced with natural wonders.





Today, the complex serves as a national memorial monument.


